Job Creating Projects (\$2.1 Million)

- Primary goal of increasing good paying jobs and/or business development and growth in the industries of tourism and outdoor recreation, medtech, high-tech hardware, semiconductors & microelectronics, advanced manufacturing, precision manufacturing, healthcare, childcare, education, and construction.
- Projects should be focused on the creation, development, or support of businesses and economic activity.
- Stronger projects also demonstrate a positive impact on the climate.

Community Enhancing Projects (\$900,000)

- Address any topic(s) in the Regional Plan Part 2, and/or industries not mentioned in the Job Creating Projects section, and/or could not meet the definition of a good paying job/income.
- Although not exhaustive, these would be topics such as housing, healthcare access, green technologies, childcare and climate adaptation.
- For projects that are not primarily climate focused, stronger projects demonstrate a positive impact on the climate.
- Collaborative decides how this funding gets spent.

Weatherization Training Center (CAPOC/No. 29)

A dedicated training facility that will serve as the hub for its Weatherization and Healthy Home Technician Apprenticeship programs. Will enable the organization to expand and formalize its Weatherization and Healthy Homes Technician Apprenticeship Programs by securing a dedicated training facility, scaling operations, and obtaining the necessary registration to become an official state-recognized apprenticeship program. Want to grow the program to serve 100 people annually from low-income communities. Apprentices will earn a stipend of \$60,000 annually while in the program. The average starting salary for these roles in Orange County is approximately \$78,748 per year.

Contruction Pre-Apprenticeships (College and Career Advantage, ROP/ No. 03)

Regional pre-apprenticeship construction program for high school and adult students in South Orange County, CA, with a focus on creating pathways to good-paying construction jobs. The program will provide students with foundational construction skills, industry-recognized certifications, workplace readiness, and career exploration, preparing them for apprenticeships and entry-level positions in the construction industry with wages averaging \$50,000 to \$80,000. Over the next three years, the program is expected to train approximately 600 individuals and increase the number of underrepresented individuals in the construction workforce.

Workforce Reentry Center (County of Orange/No. 05)

Provide vocational training and transitional housing for adults involved in the criminal justice system or other County systems of care. A two-story, 37,200 square-foot (sf) vocational/office building; a one-story, 16,166 sf retail/culinary building; and a two-story, 26,998 sf supportive housing and service building. The housing building would provide free short term (approximately six months to one year max), on-site housing for 52 program participants. The facility would include teaching skills focused on the retail and culinary industries, including producing goods that could be sold to support ongoing operations. The Project's open market will create a landscape which fosters emerging technologies and innovation and provides an environment for novice chefs to become entrepreneurs.

Little Saigon Business Community Benefit District (City of Garden Grove, Santa Ana, and Fountain Valley/No. 44)

A regional initiative to promote cultural tourism and create jobs in Orange County under the Little Saigon Business Community Benefit District and Specific Plan Project (LS-BCSP). This project aims to transform designated areas within the tri-cities into vibrant cultural hubs, incorporating streetscapes and urban design elements reminiscent of Vietnam. By enhancing public spaces and connectivity, the project will generate jobs in manufacturing, construction, and hospitality, increase foot traffic to local businesses, attract entrepreneurial ventures, and encourage housing development and investment in each city. Through this initiative, Little Saigon will emerge as a premier cultural and economic destination, driving sustainable development and long-term prosperity across Orange County.

Orange County Advanced Manufacturing Collaborative (CSUF/ No. 7)

Goal to strengthen workforce development, accelerate technology adoption, and enhance industry collaboration. By bringing together educational institutions, industry leaders, and workforce agencies, OC-AMC aims to bridge the skills gap, provide hands-on training in cutting-edge manufacturing technologies, and support small and mid-sized manufacturers in digital transformation.

Autonomous Systems Training Hub (Fullerton College/No. 36)

Provide comprehensive workforce training in autonomous systems maintenance, operations, and integration, ensuring that graduates are prepared for careers in advanced and precision manufacturing. The curriculum will focus on core technical training, industry certifications, work-based learning, and green technology and sustainability. The program aims to directly train approximately 100 students annually, that leads to goodpaying jobs with an average starting salary of \$60,000 - \$80,000 per year.

Childcare Business Incubator (CIELO No. 30)

Create a network model wherein each childcare business will be owned and operated by an entrepreneur, and bolstered by CIELO, which will provide ongoing support with marketing, outreach, training, and back-office services. Currently, CIELO's Childcare Business Incubator offers education, guidance, and inspiration to start an in-home. In one year of Phase I, 36 have successfully received their license to operate a childcare program in their home, and approximately 400 new childcare slots have been created.
